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

Descriptions of Professional Development Sessions

A General Overview of Assessments for Early Childcare Professionals

This training will provide information on the different types of assessments available to an early childcare professional. We will also go over how to utilize the information gathered from assessments.

Apples & Oranges: Childcare Professionals & Babysitters

In this training session we will discuss why childcare professionals need to be looked at as educators and not just babysitters. We will learn how to present ourselves as professionals and talk about the "20 Reasons Why Early Childhood Educators are Essential." We will also discuss why we should not compare professionals and babysitters and the differences between each role.

Block Play: Building Up the Whole Child

This session offers participants the opportunity to learn the importance and value of block play in early childhood as well as some creative DIY ways to make their own blocks.

Building a Firm Foundation with TRAILS One Block at a Time

In this series for family childcare providers, participants will receive an overview of the West Virginia Elements of Family Child Care Series. There are four 1-hour sessions that discuss how children grow, organizing a program, how children learn, and building relationships.

*There are technical assistance visits in addition to the sessions to support learning.

Building Partnerships with Families

In this training session we will be learning how to build a partnership and relationship with the families of the children in your care. We will discuss why it is so important and how it helps with child development; we will also look at the latest research on parent involvement and ways to involve parents in your program.

Building Strong Foundations: Supporting Infants and Toddlers through the West Virginia Early Learning Standards Framework: Infant/Toddler

Providers will explore the WV ELSF for Infants and Toddlers by discussing the purpose, content, application, and benefits of the Early Learning Standards, as well as how to incorporate each domain into a lesson plan. They will receive a detailed explanation of how the Early Learning Standards work, basic understanding of observations, individualized lesson planning, and how to incorporate them into a complete group weekly lesson plan for infants and toddlers.

Communicating with Parents in Family Child Care

This session will provide participants the opportunity to learn the importance of regular, respectful, and effective communication with the families in their programs. Discussion will include strategies for positive verbal communication, safe virtual communication, and multiple forms of written communication.



Descriptions of Professional Development Sessions

Emergency Preparedness 💥



In this session, participants will discuss the different types of emergencies that could happen, learn the importance of planning and preparing for those emergencies, and how to protect children and staff during and after events. Participants will receive support in creating the required emergency preparedness action plan. *There is a one-hour TA visit required to receive full credit, where participants will receive individualized support in creating the required emergency preparedness action plan.

Get to Know HighScope: An Introduction to the Curriculum

This session is a general overview of the HighScope curriculum for anyone interested in learning more about it.

Help! I'm So Stressed!

During this training we will be looking at the correlation between stressors and stress reactions in caregivers. We will learn the impact of stress on the body and we will explore and practice stress-reduction techniques for adults. We will also cover stress-reduction techniques and activities that can be shared with children.

Loose Parts Play: The What, Why & How Module Series

In this series, participants will learn WHAT loose parts play is, WHY it is important and its benefits, and HOW to implement it for the children in their care.

Mind in the Making 🔭



Mind in the Making is an 8-part learning process that focuses on the "Seven Essential Life Skills Every Child Needs" as described in Ellen Galinsky's book, "Mind in the Making." Sessions include research on child development, how children learn, and how teaching practices can encourage engaged learning; they are designed to be incorporated in the current curriculum and assist with a child's learning and development.

Mind in the Making Introduction

This session will provide directors and participants a brief overview of the Mind in the Making Module Series, expanding on why the information is important, what the participants will learn, and how they will learn it.

NAEYC Code of Ethical Conduct

This training will go through the NAEYC Code of Ethical Conduct and Statement of Commitment and why it is important to the early childhood field.

Professionalism 101

This training discusses the characteristics of professionalism in an early childhood educational setting.

Quality Care: Why is it So Important?

This session will show participants what quality care is, why it is so important, and help them gain a better understanding of what it means to provide quality care for the children who are enrolled in their programs. The impact of quality care on child development will also be discussed.

Ready, Set, Play! A Simple Guide to Exploring the Areas of Curriculum

This session will provide participants an opportunity to learn the importance of each area of curriculum and how to effectively create centers.

Sensory Processing Difficulties and the Impact on Classroom Behavior

During this introductory training, participants will be introduced to the 8 sensory systems humans use to learn about the world and look at how difficulties with these sensory systems can impact child behavior in a classroom setting. Examples of classroom and instructional adaptations and modifications to help children with sensory difficulties succeed in a classroom setting will be provided. Participants will be given an opportunity to brainstorm additional strategies to meet the unique sensory needs of the children in their care.



Descriptions of Professional Development Sessions

Social Emotional Development and Dramatic Play

In this session, participants will learn the importance and benefits of social emotional development and dramatic play and how they are connected. Milestones and social skills will also be reviewed, and participants will engage in group discussions about the current activities used in their classrooms that help develop and build upon each. The different types of dramatic play and the social emotional development and skills that can be observed during play will also be outlined while participants explore what they can do to promote the merging of the two.

Teamwork: Let's Work Together!

This session will discuss teamwork at work, why it is important, and how to go from being a good team member to a great one. It will also get colleagues interacting with one another while having them work together as a team. In doing so, they will learn some things about their co-workers they may not have known prior to this session.

The 5 Ws for Lesson Planning

This training will focus on lesson planning. We will discuss what makes a lesson plan, the planning process, the people involved in that process, and the information that needs to be included on a lesson plan. This training will also look at the differences between an individualized plan and a group plan.

The Importance of Family Style Dining in Preschool

Is family style dining something that gets overlooked in your preschool environment? Do you have a hard time implementing it during mealtimes? In this training session, we will discuss the challenges and benefits of family style dining, how to start incorporating it, and review ideas to support learning activities during mealtimes.

Understanding ACEs: ACEs 101 🦄

During this training session, participants will be introduced to the concept of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) through awareness and education. Participants will learn about ACEs and the overall impact they have on children and adults. Participants will become familiar with the 10 types of ACEs and gain an understanding of ways to overcome them.

WVIT I-R

Professional development is an ongoing process. Trainers and administrators will work together to monitor the personal and professional growth of infant/toddler caregivers and help to develop a plan that responds directly to the needs of the children in their care.

PLAY

- Play enables children to develop their language, social-emotional and cognitive skills. It also encourages imagination and creativity.
- Learning through play comes in many forms such as imaginary play, cooperative play and physical play.

WRITE

- Writing helps children develop motor skills and understand that written words represent ideas. It allows children to express themselves through language.
- Through writing, they also learn the conventions of written language and how to read. At the pre-writing stage, they do not need to write legibly – being able to scribble or trace is a good start.



SING

- Singing helps your child learn how to hear smaller sounds in words. Learning to hear and break down parts of words help your child develop phonological awareness, which will help him learn to read.
- Do not be afraid of being silly or singing offkey; your child will not mind at all. He is more likely to love the great bonding experience of singing with you!

TALK

- Talking helps a child develop early literacy skills. Nurture your babbling baby into a talkative toddler by talking and reading to him often. Talking is also an excellent way to build his narrative skills. These skills are help him with reading as he grows older.
- Read aloud and encourage your child to read along with you. You can initiate conversations about stories by asking, "What do you see on this page?" or "What do you think will happen next?"



READ

- Reading with children develops their language and literacy skills. Words can be found all around us, for example, on cereal boxes and advertisements.
- Recognizing such environmental print allows children to differentiate text from pictures at an early age by reading the words in their immediate surroundings.

12 language and literacy activities for preschoolers

Worksheet for educators



Treasure Hunt

Use a tray, or a toy box and throw a bunch of toys in it. Close your eyes and go on a "treasure hunt."

You can also do this activity covering toys with the sand. As the children take turns and pull toys out of the box, encourage them to talk about each object.



Snowball throw alphabet game

Paper, tape and ping-pong balls are all you need for this game of 'snowball' throwing. Tape a bunch of letters to a wall, call out the sounds and have your kids throw the snowball at the letter represented. As an added bonus, kids get to work on their coordination as well as their alphabet.



Letter matching archaeology game

The perfect accompaniment to a dinosaur-themed unit, this activity allows children to practice letter recognition while playing archaeologist. Drop a few magnetic letters onto a cookie sheet, writing the letters you chose on a piece of paper for the children to use as a key. Cover the letters in flour and give the kids a brush to carefully 'search the site' for hidden letters. When they find one, they must match it to their paper key before continuing the hunt.



Shaving cream writing

For this activity you'll need baking paper and nonmenthol aerosol shaving cream

Lay out paper flat on a table. Children spray a large pile of shaving cream on the area. Have them spread out the cream and practice their writing skills.

This activity will be very helpful with fine motor skills also visual and tactical learners will benefit. The more senses you use, the more you learn. Do this activity to practise letters, writing words, writing cursive, numbers, and doing addition.



Blocks

Build castles, houses, farms. Once your masterpiece is built, create stories out of your play animals and people.



Mini alphabet sensory bins

Tape the letter on the front of each box, or let the kids guess the letter as they examine the objects. Either way, these sensory bins transform a fun, hands-on play activity into a literacy lesson.



Crocodile circle

Picture a bin with a crocodile face on top, filled with letters and surprise cards. Children pass the crocodile around the circle singing "Crocodile, crocodile down by lake, I'm going to reach right in and see what (letter) you ate". The child holding the crocodile then pulls a letter and calls it out. Extra surprise cards can let you repeat a turn, reverse directions or anything else you want to include.



Lotto with pictures

This game can be played with 2-4 players. Each player chooses a board and finds the tiles that match his or her board. Turn those tiles over and mix them up. The first player should draw a picture tile from the pile. If the picture matches the player's board, the player keeps the tile and puts it on his board. If it does not match, the player puts it back into the pile. The next player gets a turn. The game is continued in this way until one player has found all six of his or her tiles and wins the game.



Bringing books to life

Read a story/rhyme together and discuss which characters you each want to be. Consider the props you might want to bring to this story alive. You might create caves and homes with blankets and cushions - you may even like to close the blinds and use a torch to create a spooky atmosphere. Put some enthusiasm into your storytelling or rhyme and discuss what is happening within the story.



What Goes Together Game

Say a noun, such as 'flower'. Next, have the child say or write three to five words that tell about the word. For example, for flower they might say: pretty, blue, tiny, tall, or smelly.



Storytelling

Picture books are great to use for storytelling. And storytelling is a fantastic activity for children to learn how to construct their message, to learn new vocabulary, to sharpen memory and to improve listening skills. Simply encourage children to describe what they see. It might be especially funny experience if children take turns page after page.



Outdoor Drawing Activity

Invite children to pair up and sit back to back so they can each see a different part of the grounds. Have children spend 2-5 minutes carefully drawing what they see, in silence. Then give them a few minutes to share their drawings and tell their partners about two or three things they saw.

Mind in the Making

Building essential life skills in children by transforming groundbreaking research into practice



MITM'S SEVEN ESSENTIAL LIFE SKILLS

Helps adults understand and encourage important executive function-based skills children need to thrive.

- **1. Focus and Self Control** Children need this skill to achieve goals, especially in a world filled with distractions and information overload. This includes paying attention, exercising self-control, remembering the rules, and thinking flexibility.
- **2. Perspective Taking** This involves understanding what others think and feel, and forms the basis for children's understanding of the intentions of parents, teachers and friends. Children with this skill are less likely to get involved in conflicts.
- **3. Communicating** Much more than reading, writing and speaking, communicating is the skill of determining what one wants to communicate and realizing how it will be understood by others. It is the skill teachers and employers feel is most lacking today.
- 4. Making Connections This involves deciphering what's the same, what's different, and sorting them into categories. Making unusual connections is at the core of creativity and moves children beyond knowing information to using information well.
- **5. Critical Thinking** This skill helps children analyze and evaluate information to guide their beliefs, decisions and actions. Children need critical thinking to make sense of the world around them and to solve problems.
- **6. Taking on Challenges** Children who take on challenges instead of avoiding or simply coping with them achieve better outcomes in school and in life.
- **7. Self-Directed, Engaged Learning** By setting goals and strategies for learning, children become attuned and better prepared to change as the world changes. This helps children foster their innate curiosity to learn and helps them realize their potential.




This is a nine-hour module series, broken up into three 3-hour classes. This series meets the criteria for the Infant Toddler Specialization with the WV Child Care Credential program.

NEWBORN - 1 YEAR

- Point at things and name them (dog, cat, house, car)
- Talk back and forth with your baby
- Play games with them while you are reading



1 YEAR - 2 YEARS

- Smile and answer your child's questions
- · Encourage them to point at objects and name them
- Have them help turn the pages



2 YEARS - 3 YEARS

- Ask them questions about the book
- Talk about the pictures and what the words mean
- Let them pick out the book they want to read
- Reward them and set goals for reading



3 YEARS - 4 YEARS

- Point out letters and numbers
- Look at pictures and make-up stories about them
- · Talk about the different characters
- Ask them their take on the story



4 YEARS - 5 YEARS

- Have your child tell the story
- Encourage writing and drawing
- Ask them the meaning of the story
- · Have a conversation about what the words mean
